

WHY IS IT CALLED 'LITTLE ROCK?'

Little Rock is Arkansas' capital and largest city. The city is named after a small rock formation on the south bank of the Arkansas River that was first noted and named by the French explorer, Bernard de la Harpe in 1722. He called the navigational landmark La Petite Roche, the "little rock" in French. The rock formation can still be seen at Riverfront Park in downtown Little Rock. The first European settler was a fur trapper named William Lewis, who built a house here in 1812. (Information derived from www.u-s-history.com).



QUICK LOOK: CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL

If you get the chance, visit Little Rock Central High School, a National Historic Site. Central High found itself in the middle of the 1957 desegregation crisis. and is now recognized for its role in the desegregation of public schools.

The nine African-American students' persistence in attending the formerly all-white Central High School was the most prominent national example of the implementation of the May 17, 1954 Supreme Court decision Brown v. Board of Education.

The Little Rock Central High Visitors Center is open daily from 9:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. and is located at 2120 W Daisy L. Gaston Bates Dr., Little Rock 72202. (Information derived from www.nps.gov/chsc)


